# Council passes FY20 budget

After several attempts to amend the Town Manag- budget of \$50,835,254. er's budget request the Town Council finally approved the FY20 budget figure (including enterprise funds, revolving funds and a one-time transfer for capital) is \$64,866,135.

The general fund budget of \$52,546,470 is a roughly 3 percent increase over FY19

The school department will receive \$21,275,036 a roughly 4 percent increase over the FY19 school budget of \$20,141,310.

Before the vote Tuesday

night the council heard from Bob Wynne Jr., chairman of the Citizen's Advisory Committee on Finance.

"This is the first time for the Finance Committee to work with the new town management. The budget was

completed much earlier than in the past," he said. "We also met with many more department heas than in the past."

He added that the budget was based on the House of Representatives state budget which would give the town an additional \$178,476 in state aid. Of that amount the school department received \$113,726.

Of all the expenses the town faces one of the largest is

the payment for regional dispatch. In the beginning four communities were supposed to be in it but only Revere and Winthrop are in the service and pay a hefty price. In fiscal year 2017 when the regional dispatch began the cost to Winthrop was \$192,600. Now in fiscal year 2020 the town has a fee of \$450,000.

"Regional dispatch is a good idea and both chiefs

favor it. Grants have helped offset some of the cost but we are concerned about annual growth," Wynne said.

He also noted that this year is the first the ferry is not requesting any money from the town, it has found other funding sources, but he has concerns about its future and whether or not the town should be running a ferry business.

As eighth-graders you were extremely determined to be in the high school, this determination showed on the stage, the classroom and the playing field.

"But it was 75 percent of you who indicted 'volunteer-ism' as your word to describe the class," he said. "In the past five years it's made a difference in our school. You named school and community events that you participated in that were designed to help others in need. Your biggest impact on our school was you stepping up and helping others, influencing and inspiring your peers to do the same."

"Your determination, success, and impact at Winthrop High School wouldn't be possible if you didn't have great teachers along the way," Crombie said. "The surveys showed that support from your family and friends has been essential. When asked who was the most influential person in your life, 87 percent of you indicated it was someone in your immediately family."

The most important question in the survey was "what meaningful address would you give an incoming ninth grader – the common theme from your responses was you

would encourage them to take risks and make the most of every opportunity, Crombie said.

"The most common phrase was 'just be yourself,' 'do everything' and 'be kind'. You already know what is truly important.

"No matter where you go or what you do just be you

### NO FARMER'S **MARKET THIS YEAR**

According the the Winthrop Farmer's Market website, 'The Winthrop Farmers Market (WFM) will suspend market operations for the 2019 season.

Several factors contributed to this decision including the planned construction in Winthrop Center, changes in customer and vendor interests, as well as the need to revitalize the WFM volunteer base.

"We are very excited about the plans for French Square," says WFM Board President, Donna Sears. "We appreciated that the town asked for our input and took into consideration WFM activities when completing landscape design. We hope that when construction is finished it will be an even better setup for the market as well as help attract new vendors and customers."

Sarah Oosten, owner of La Petite Boutique and WFM Vice President, echoed the Board's president, "We've had markets at other locations, but French Square has worked the best in terms of drawing customers and facilitating vendor

setup. We are very grateful to all of our loyal customers and, of course, the vendors that come back year after year."

Devoted WFM customers have also expressed a desire for additional market dates, vendors and more activities. "Donna and the Board work hard to bring something new to each market but we are limited in resources. Many of our vendors and customers don't realize that the planning and operation is 100% volunteer run, all of whom have fulltime jobs. We're doing this because we believe this market has an important role in our community," says Marcie Moline, the WFM Board Secretary.

The need to revitalize the WFM volunteer membership is another reason for the hiatus. The Board hopes that 2019 can be used to re-group and identify other Winthrop residents and stakeholders who would be interested in the long-term sustainability of the market. 





### **GIRLS LACROSSE** WINS TOURNEY OPENER, PLAYS AT MANCHESTER **TODAY**

The Winthrop High girls lacrosse team won the first-ever state tournament game in the program's history with a scintillating 12-10 upset victory over St. Mary's of Lynn this past Monday in the opening round of the Division 2 North Sectional of the MIAA tour-

The triumph advances coach Ben Cimmino's crew to the quarterfinals when they will travel to Manchester/Essex today (Thursday) at 3:30

The Lady Vikings are the 12th seed in the D-2 North among the 16 teams in the sectional with a 12-7 regular-season record. Manchester/Essex is the fourth seed and sported a 12-5 regular-season mark. Manchester handily defeated Lowell Catholic in its opening round contest, 15-2.

Winthrop came out on fire in its battle with St. Mary's (which was the fifth seed in the D-2 North with a 16-4 record) taking an early lead and holding it for most of the game until St. Mary's tied matters with about 10 minutes to play.

However, the Lady Vikings refused to buckle to the favored Lady Spartans and responded by netting two goahead goals to close it out.

### WHS BOYS TENNIS WINS TOURNEY **OPENER**

The Winthrop High boys tennis team, which made school history with a best-ever 13-3 record in program history, added to their laurels with a 5-0 shutout victory over Arlington Catholic on Monday on the WHS courts in an opening round contest of the Division 3 North Sectional of the MIAA state team tennis tournament.

The victory marked only the second tourney triumph in the WHS boys program's history, the first having come four years ago with a win over Swampscott.

Winthrop High senior captain Dan Gillis put an exclamation point on his outstanding high school baseball career with a brilliant, 1-0 shutout victory over Peabody this past week.

Gillis allowed just four hits, while fanning four opponents and walking only one, to pick up the complete-game triumph.

"That performance completed what you could call a generational season for Dan," said veteran WHS head coach Frank DeMarco.

Gillis was named to the first-team, All-NEC South team, becoming the first Winthrop player chosen under the new all star format. WHS sophomore David DiCicco,

"It is amazing that a 125-pound player -- although Dan would remind you that he is up 10 pounds over last year -- could put up the kind of numbers he has," said DeMarco, noting that Gillis was 3-3 with a 3.05 ERA with seven starts, four complete games, and one shutout. Gillis recorded 37 strikeouts and allowed only 10 walks for the season.

"Dan also relieved in two other games, which means that he pitched in almost half our games," DeMarco added.

Gillis also was a potent force at the plate and was a model of consistency. He finished the season with a .338 average and had a base hit in 19 of the Vikings' 20 games this season.

"The last Winthrop baseball players to be in this category of pitcher/hitter were the late Cory Collins, who hit .350 and was 6-1 as a pitcher, and Matt Moore, who hit .307 and was 5-2 as a pitcher," said DeMarco. "This happened in the same year in 2007. It took 12 years to see this again and what makes Dan's accomplishment so remarkable is that he did it for a team that finished 6-14, while the 2007 team was 14-6 and won the NEC title."

Gillis will be furthering his education at Bentley University, where he hopes to continue his baseball career.

### SPEAKER DELEO PREPARES FOR THE FUTURE

Massachusetts House Speaker Robert DeLeo this week unveiled the details of the plan he announced last February that will provide \$1.3 billion to combat the ever-increasing effects of climate change. Among the major aspects of the plan will be the awarding of grants to cities and towns across the state to encourage green energy initiatives and climate change resiliency efforts, which are particularly needed for our vulnerable coastal

The grant program, called GreenWorks, would be funded by \$1 billion in bonds and paid out over a decade. The program, to be run by the state Executive Office of Energy and Environmental Affairs, will allow local governments to seek grants for a variety of projects that will focus on climate change preparedness and clean energy production in order to reduce carbon emissions.

The bill also would set aside an additional \$295 million in state spending for energy infrastructure, including \$100 million for municipal microgrid systems to increase the resiliency of the electricity grid and \$125 million for electric vehicles in municipal fleets and regional transit authorities.

There no longer is any dispute that climate change is occurring and that our coastal communities, including the City of Boston, are ill-prepared at the present time to address the twin threats of rising sea levels and more powerful storms.

Speaker DeLeo's GreenWorks initiative represents a major step forward in protecting our vulnerable coastline, while at the same time creating jobs in the green energy and clean tech in-

Given the urgency and pressing need to address the issue of climate change, which is occurring at an ever-accelerating pace, we urge our state senators to join with Speaker DeLeo and the Mass. House in presenting a bill for Gov. Charlie Baker's signature by the end of this year.

### A Green New Deal of Action

Massachusetts needs its own Green New Deal – but it needs to be a deal of action.

By Jack Clarke

Although not a law but more a resolution expressing the will of the Congress on the necessity to address the climate crisis and economic inequality, the Green New Deal, filed by New York Congresswoman Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez and our own Sen. Ed Markey, was killed by the Senate in a vote following no review and analysis by legislative staff, no expert testimony or committee hearings, and no floor debate. The message was clear: the U.S. Senate does not want to discuss the climate's breakdown. So we

The name harkens back to the New Deal and its social and economic reforms, and public works projects, undertaken by President Franklin Roosevelt in response to the Great Depression.

at the state level will.

The Green New Deal echoes Roosevelt's economic stimuli incentives and adds plans for renewable energy and resource efficiency.

FDR's New Deal was not realized in one bill in one year, but became law through various pieces of legislation over the first three years of his first administration. Beacon Hill lawmakers should also develop an ambitious multi-year

plan to meaningfully confront climate change, the most urgent threat of our lifetime, in their version of a Green New Deal – but it needs to be more than a good idea. And it needs to pass.

Although the national Green New Deal is admittedly a vision statement, the Massachusetts version should be a statutory set of requirements with goals, targets, and reasonable dates that move us forward in addressing the climate breakdown.

Our version should start with and include at a minimum, laws establishing:

§ Zero net carbon emisemits only the carbon emissions that it can capture or reabsorb - by 2050.

§ An annual increase in the amount of clean energy that utilities are required to buy, leading to 100 percent renewables - by 2047.

§ Environmentally responsible development of 6,000 megawatts of offshore wind energy, and quickly scaling up from there. This is well beyond the 1,600 MW required now - by 2027.

§ A carbon fee: Massachusetts and eight other states, along with the District of Columbia, are presently participating in the Transportation Carbon Initiative that would cap regional transportation emissions and require fuel wholesalers to buy pollution

permits for the fuels they sell. Revenues from the sale of the permits would then go back to states for investments in public transit, electric vehicles, bike lanes, and other initiatives to reduce carbon emissions in the transportation sector – by 2021. And if the regional approach fails, Massachusetts needs to be ready to go out on our own and pass a statewide carbon fee.

§ Improved solar options: allow net metering not just for Massachusetts homes but for all non-residential solar facilities to free up Bay State businesses and communities ence today, such as stronger to build more solar projects, sions, meaning Massachusetts create more jobs, and allow for millions of dollars of investments – by 2021.

> § Create green jobs: Mobilize the academic and research assets of the Commonwealth to more fully contribute to the innovation economy and create more green jobs. This will require increased investments of private and state funds in Massachusetts' 114 colleges and universities to research and apply advanced technologies in the fields of deep-water offshore wind energy, solar, carbon capture and re-use, and long-term high-quantity battery storage. This investment in education and innovation would unleash clean energy jobs. Although there are 110,700 such jobs in the Commonwealth workforce today, it's still just 3 percent of

Massachusetts employment. It needs to grow substantially – by 2021.

§ Environmental, social and economic justice principles should be embedded in all newly passed state laws whereby the power of communities of color, low-income, rural, indigenous, under-represented and non-English speaking residents in Massachusetts would be harnessed to help eradicate environmental racism and classism, to create healthy, and sustainable communities – by 2019.

The changes we experistorms, accelerated sea-level rise, and intense heat are just the beginning of what should be expected.

There needs to be a sense of urgency on Beacon Hill when it comes to our climate emergency, especially as recent reports from the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change and the National Climate Assessment warn we have only 12 years to figure out a solution before things really start to fall apart.

For my grandchildren, six year old Haley and her five year old brother Jack, who will be teenagers in twelve years, it is time for lawmakers to act, and to act now.

# Remembering Winthrop's Dick O'Connell

Winthrop native Dick O'Connell passed away in 2002, just two years before the Red Sox 86-year World Series drought ended.

It has been written that O'Connell benefitted from being a "classic outsider" in an organization marked by cronyism- Tom Yawkey's men.

In his youth, O'Connell starred on Winthrop's town baseball team. He then attended Boston College, graduating in 1937 and achieving a Masters Degree the following year. Along the way, like many Winthrop men, he worked as a longshoreman in the busy port of Boston.

O'Connell served in Naval Intelligence in World War 2, where he befriended re-

he joined the Red Sox organization in 1947 as head of the Lynn Red Sox of the New England League and found he had a knack for business.

After the NEL folded, O'Connell joined the Sox as "home secretary" in the early 50's and rose through the ranks. By 1960, he had achieved the title of "business manager".

By 1965, with the team losing 100 games and drawing less than 8,000 fans per game, Yawkey was disgusted and even considered moving the team. In a very positive move, he fired Pinky Higgins as GM and hired O'Connell.

nowned Boston sportscaster scouting and some sound play-Jim Britt. With Britt's help, er moves, O'Connell's team shocked the baseball world with the Impossible Dream season just two years later.

Howard Bryant's excellent book Shut Out, which is an examination of racism on the Sox, extols O'Connell's abilities ."For the first time, the Red Sox were truly an integrated team that relied on players of all races to succeed. It was a by-product of his being able to develop talent without the specter of the old prejudices.

According to Bentley Athletic Director Bob DeFelice, a Winthrop product who played for the Red Sox organization for a few years, "O' Connell With the help of improved was great. He treated me like

a superstar..It was beyond hospitality.

Despite another pennant in 1975, Dick was fired by Jean Yawkey soon after her husband's death in July 1976. She did not share her husband's opinion of him and wished to put personnel decisions in the hands of Haywood Sullivan and Buddy Leroux. The move did not help the team. However, not only did O'Connell build two pennant-winning clubs, but totally changed the Red Sox image. ARTICLE 882 - STORM DAMAGE ON SHORE DRIVE IN 1909






Living in a New England seacoast community provides an exposure to possible property damage due to ocean storms, snow blizzards from the Midwest and the tail end of hurricanes from the Caribbean. When one looks back at the 50 or so major snow storms recorded from 1635 to date, the dozen or so large hurricanes since 1850 and the hundreds of lesser storms that have also descended on us, we are lucky not to have sustained more major damage. The photographs of wind and water damage from 1900 to date record the after effects of some of these storms. Today's "Then and Now" Article shows the damage at either end of Winthrop Shore Drive resulting from ocean storms. First, at the southern end of Shore Drive, picture #1 depicts how the buildings at the entrance to the Edward Rowe Snow footpath around the ocean side of Water Tower Hill appeared in 2014. Picture #2 reveals the damage

sustained by these buildings during the Christmas 1909 major Snowstorm. If one then looks at the other end of Shore Drive where it intersects with Crest and Grovers Avenues, picture #3 depicts the seaside area as it appeared in 2014. Note the small "jog" in the seawall a short distance out as the surface area curves to the left to accommodate the Narrow Gauge Railroad tracks which passed under Grovers Avenue and then ran beside the Highlands (Dalrymple) School. These tracks then progressed on behind the current Doctors Building on to where the Highlands Station was located on the site of the present World War II Memorial Park/ Playground and Crest Avenue parking lot. Picture #4 shows the damage sustained along the same stretch of seawall as a result of the 1931 storm. Note the metal poles that supported the wires installed in 1928 when the railroad was electrified. Again the small "jog" in the seawall is visible at the right. While some damage to buildings along Shore Drive did occur during these and other storms, most structures were repairable and are still with us today. Many efforts to minimize the erosion of our coastline during storms such as the construction of sea walls along Winthrop Shore Drive and several jetties protruding out into the ocean have been pursued. As a WPA project, during the depression, the "three sisters" off shore breakwaters were constructed in 1933 followed with the addition of two more in 1935 for a total of the five which are there today. In spite of these efforts we still experience some damage from time to time due to storms. Current activity to replace sand along the shore drive beach is in progress. Studies to provide further protection are ongoing and those interested in this effort should volunteer to become involved in these planning programs.

Yacht racing had a fine start to the 1919 season on Memorial Day, with the holding of the 50th annual regatta sponsored by the So. Boston Yacht Club.

The body of a 22-year-old sailor, who was being held at the Navy's detention camp on Deer Island, washed ashore on the beach at the foot of Otis St. on Pt. Shirley. The sailor apparently hd tried to escape from the prison.

One of the most elaborate funeral cars built in America has come to the Skaggs Funeral Home here in Winthrop.

### 110 years ago June 5, 1909

The Cliff House held its opening ball of the season with 150 persons in attendance. The verandahs were all ablaze in red, white, and blue electric lights and the scene was one of beauty because of the handsome toilettes worn and the gayety of the company.

### 120 years ago June 9, 1899

Town Meeting adjourned after considering two-thirds of the new proposed town by-laws.

Potter's stable on Shirley St. now is open and a livery business begun. The large, three-seated carriage was in demand even before the vehicle arrived here. Boarders are arriving for the summer season and a special contract for daily horse hire with one family already has been made.

### 130 years ago June 7, 1889

A Town Meeting has been set for Monday to take up the matter of the School Committee's recommendation for an addition to the Pauline St. School.

here are familiar with us and have ties to us" he said, adding that "we have made a lot of donations to the town and we helped the community any way we could", mentioning that the store has been involved with several community events like sponsoring the Winthrop Chamber of Commerce Day At The Beach and serving apple cider at the town's Christmas tree-light-

Having been working as a deli clerk at Winthrop Marketplace for about a year now, I have noticed that Winthrop Marketplace is more than just a grocery store for local residents. Every day I see customers otherwise unknown to each other having spirited conversations on topics ranging from the news of the day to their favorite cold cuts. Twenty years is a long time and the Winthrop Marketplace has big plans for its upcoming celebration during the week of June 6-13. The store's recent-



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
